Directions: Analyze the document and answer the questions.

Background: After purchasing the Louisiana Territory from France in 1803, President Jefferson sent the Corps of Discovery, led by William Clark and Meriwether Lewis, to explore the territory and beyond, find a water route to the Pacific Ocean, and establish a presence for future land claims. Lewis and Clark made maps, established peaceful contact with many Native nations, and cataloged species of plants and animals. The expedition lasted from May 1804 to September 1806.

12th November Monday 1804

The Big bellies & Watersoons are at war with the Snake Indians & Seauex, and were at war with the *Ricares* untill we made peace a fiew days passd.—
The Mandans are at War with all who make war on them, at present with the Seauex only, and wish to be at peace with *all* nations, Seldom the agressors—

Sunday 13th July 1805

I saw Several Antelope Common Deer, wolves, beaver, Otter, Eagles, hawks, Crows, wild gees both old and young, does &c. &c. I observe Several leading roads which appear to pass to a gap of the mountain in a E. N E. direction about 18 or 20 miles distant. The indian woman [Sacagawea] who has been of great Service to me as a pilot through this Country recommends a gap in the mountain more South which I shall cross.—.

November 7th Thursday 1805 Great joy in camp we are in *View* of the *Ocian*, this great Pacific Octean which we been So long anxious to See. and the roreing or noise made by the waves brakeing on the rockey Shores (as I Suppose) may be heard distictly

Monday September 17th 1804. to the West a high range of hills, strech across the country...was still farther hightened by immence herds of Buffaloe deer Elk and Antelopes which we saw in every direction feeding on the hills and plains. I do not think I exagerate when I estimate the number of Buffaloe which could be compreed at one view to amount to 3000.

Wednesday August 14th [1805] In order to give Capt. Clark time to reach the forks of Jefferson's river I concluded to spend this day at the Shoshone Camp and obtain what information I could with rispect to the country. as we had nothing but a little flour and parched meal to eat except the berries with which the Indians furnished us I directed Drewyer and Shields to hunt a few hours and try to kill something, the Indians furnished them with horses and most of their young men also turned out to hunt.
